



ANDERSON COOPER

Anderson Cooper is the anchor of CNN's *Anderson Cooper 360°*, airing weeknights at 8:00 p.m. ET on CNN and simulcast on CNN International. Cooper is also the host of the popular podcast *All There Is with Anderson Cooper*. Through moving and honest discussions, he shares his deeply personal journey to understand his own grief and learn from others who have experienced life-altering loss. His weekly companion show, "All There Is Live with Anderson Cooper," streams Thursdays at 9:15 p.m. ET on the All There Is community page, where listeners can share their stories and engage with Cooper, his guests, and each other—both online and on air. Since April 2023, he has also hosted "The Whole Story with Anderson Cooper," which airs Sundays on CNN and features character-driven storytelling and investigative deep dives from CNN anchors and correspondents.

Since the start of his career in 1992, Cooper has worked in nearly eighty countries and has covered major news events around the world, often reporting from the scene.

Cooper has played a pivotal role in CNN's political and election coverage, anchoring from conventions and moderating several presidential primary debates and town halls. In 2016, he was selected by the Committee on Presidential Debates to co-moderate one of the three debates between Donald Trump and Hillary Clinton.

In addition to his work at CNN, Cooper is a regular correspondent for CBS's "60 Minutes."

At CNN and "60 Minutes," Cooper has earned several major journalism awards. He contributed to CNN's Peabody Award-winning coverage of Hurricane Katrina and its duPont Award-winning coverage of the 2004 tsunami. Additionally, he has received twenty-three Emmy Awards, including two for his coverage of the earthquake in Haiti, as well as an Edward R. Murrow Award.

Cooper's four books—*Astor: The Rise and Fall of an American Fortune*; *Vanderbilt: The Rise and Fall of an American Dynasty*; *The Rainbow Comes and Goes: A Mother and Son on Life, Love, and Loss*; and *Dispatches from the Edge: A Memoir of Wars, Disaster, and Survival*—all topped *The New York Times* Best Seller list.

Before joining CNN, Cooper was an ABC News correspondent and host of the network's reality program "The Mole." He also anchored ABC's overnight newscast "World News Now" and served as a correspondent for "World News Tonight" as well as "20/20."

Cooper joined ABC from Channel One News, where he served as chief international correspondent. During that time, he reported on and produced stories from conflicts in Bosnia, Cambodia, Haiti, Israel, Myanmar, Russia, Rwanda, Somalia, and South Africa. Channel One News was a school television network seen daily in more than 12,000 classrooms nationwide.

Cooper graduated from Yale University in 1989 with a Bachelor of Arts in political science. He also studied Vietnamese at the University of Hanoi. He is based in New York City.
